Upper Sand Island Recording

URARA and the Moab and Monticello BLM field offices recently collaborated to record the rock art at Upper Sand Island. The 0.6 mile cliff face was exposed to increased visitation when the fuels shop removed the tamarisk and Russian olive on the floodplain in the area in front of the panels. The BLM provided professional support, a group campground at Sand Island for the volunteers, indoor space for the field work sessions, and miscellaneous supplies. URARA provided a grant to cover costs of direct expenses such as photography, printing, mylar, pens, scanning of images, etc.

Ann Phillips and Leigh Grench (BLM Fuels Archaeologist) led the project assisted by a four member team of Pamela and Quentin Baker, Janet Lever-Wood, and Dave Manley. It was, however, the serious commitment and devotion on the part of Ann Phillips which inspired and motivated the project. The entire team spent weekends in January and February and then a week in March preparing for the volunteer drawers to join them for a week in April. During the April session, which included the participation of over thirty volunteers from 7 states, Dell Crandall and April 2012

Claudia Berner acted as campground hosts. Several local professional archaeologists also joined the recording effort. Elaine Holmes and Anne McConnell anchored the office and kept up with data entry.

Upper Sand Island is a multi-component site with possible paleo panels, as well as archaic Glen Canyon Linear images, Puebloan and proto-historic imagery. The area also contains fragile middens with the potential to yield further information. Many of the panels are very high which presented a challenge to the photographer as well as the drawers. At times Dave Manley's camera was 40 feet off the ground on an extended tripod and remotely controlled by computer.

The project presented a short report at the ARARA meeting in St. George and will provide more detailed information at URARA's symposium in Vernal in September.

URARA Members Recognized By ARARA



At the recent American Rock Art Research Association symposium in St. George, Utah, two URARA members received national recognition for their outstanding contributions to rock art research.

Ann Phillips received the Frank and A.J. Bock Award for extraordinary achievement over her lifetime. Larry Loendorf, when presenting the award noted Ann's work in Canyon de Chelly, Chaco Canyon, Cedar Mesa, and Sand island. Janet Lever-Wood also presented Ann with a quilt in recognition of her contributions to rock art research, conservation, preservation, and education.

Dave Manley received the Oliver Award for rock art photography. The award is for his artistic achievements in recognizing and emphasizing the importance of context in rock art documentation and his technical achievements in developing a method of photographing high panels at Upper Sand Island. Dave was presented with a \$500 check.

Accommodations

There is good news and bad news regarding accommodations in Vernal. The Board has been concerned that hotel rooms may be tight for symposium. However, I have called most of the hotels in town in the last couple of weeks and all of them have availability. However, no one is providing a group rate and only one hotel has been willing to reserve a block of rooms.

The reality of Vernal is that it is a small town with a booming petroleum industry. My advice is to get your reservations early.

For those who want to bring a trailer, or sleep in your vehicle, the Events Center will allow us to use their back parking lot, as they have in the past. You won't find electricity, picnic tables, or green turf, but there are toilets and you will be conveniently located to the symposium location. Use of this area is free.

The following is a list of hotels in Vernal. The quality rating is from the website Trip Advisor with "1" being the highest rated hotel. In my experience, the lowest rates in Vernal are going to be in the \$70 range.

Our symposium program is rapidly filling up with interesting speakers and topics. The Saturday September 22nd opening session will focus on the people who have inhabited northeastern Utah and western Colorado for several thousands of years. Anthropologist, Dr. Lynda McNeil, will chair this session and introduce our speakers who will include researcher and author Carol Patterson, Ute Tribal Elder Clifford Duncan, State BLM archeologist Byron Loosle, researcher Wendy Lockwood, and Carolynne Merell who will compare elements of McKonkie ranch petroglyphs to Pueblo warrior iconography.

The Saturday afternoon session will include presentations on Barrier Canyon Style by Richard Jenkinson and David Sucec. The second afternoon session will focus on the art of recording rock art. Dr. Ann Phillips will discuss the Sand Island rock art documentation project. Other artists will show their drawings and talk about the discovery process at rock art sites.

Sunday morning is shaping up to be a session on the big questions in Utah's cultural history. Art historian Jim Farmer will talk about the origins of Pueblo religion. Steve Waller will explore the

relationship between myth and audio characteristics of rock art sites. Galal Gough will discuss ceremonial gourds and rain rattles.

Former state archeologist Kevin Jones will open Sunday afternoon's preservation session with his observations of the politics of protecting rock art. The session will also highlight what was learned from the Sand Island documentation project which involved many enthusiastic URARA members.


Auction News
