Field trips

Also on Thursday we will be organizing a documentation trip to Crescent Junction. The Bakers will be preparing photos of the site so that we can use the drawing technique used at Sand Island. It makes documentation very easy and intuitive. Walt Layton will show us how to do that part of the process. Leigh Grench, a BLM archeologist from Moab, will help us identify the archeology, prepare site maps, and complete the IMACS form. This is a great opportunity to learn about documentation. For those of you who prefer a more individualized approach to viewing your rock art Dell is preparing several self-guided rock art tours.

We have one final special event. Francois Gohier will be spending the entire day on Friday Oct 11 at the Thompson Wash rock art site, often known as Sego Canyon. I consider this Utah's best rock art site with spectacular Ute, Fremont, and Barrier Canyon images located within a few yards of each other. I hope that many of you who are interested in a less intense field trip will drop by to talk to him about this fantastic site.

Nina Bowen announces that there will be a great lineup of speakers at this year's symposium. Sally Cole has agreed to be one of the keynote speakers this year, and will be sharing her insights on the Mill Creek Moab recording project. Pecos Conference

This year's Pecos Conference is in Flagstaff, August 8 - 11. Put it on your calendar. See http://www.swanet.org/2013_pecos_conference/. First inspired and organized by A.V. Kidder in 1927, the Pecos Conference has no formal organization or permanent leadership. It is run much like the mountain man rendezvous of old, for archaeologists to knock the dust off their fedoras at the end of the field season, sit around the campfire, review their work and swap stories.

Proposed Potash Mine in Pilot Valley

URARA has been invited to work with the Oregon-California Trails Association (OCTA) to review a proposal for a potash mine in Pilot Valley. Pilot Valley is on the branch of the Immigrant trail across the Bonneville Salt Flats called the Hastings Cutoff. Seldom used after the Donner-Reed Party's famous adventure in 1846, the route still shows a surface trace (see the Crater Island 7 1/2' topographic quadrangle). There is reputed to be rock art near Donner Spring, on the west side of Pilot Valley. Oscar Olson is looking into it.

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
