The BLM has extended the public comment period for the proposed amendment to the East Lake Mountain Target Shooting Plan, so if you still need to submit comments in writing you will have more time to do so. **These comments must be received in the BLM Salt Lake Field Office by August 20, 2015, not postmarked by that date.** This deadline is for **written comments only**. The Amendment covers all BLM-administered lands in Utah County to the west of Utah SR 68 and located in T7S, R1W, Sections 13, 24, 26, 27, and 28. See:



We believe attending these public meetings is crucial to gaining support from other individuals and groups to URARA's position, the main points of which are:

1. Close these public lands to discharge of firearms
2. No Motorized Vehicle traffic except on permitted and/or designated access roads
3. Prohibit overnight camping and other associated activities for prevention of wild fires
4. Provide enforcement of closure to insure public safety and protection of cultural resources and the surrounding environment.

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Kenneth Johnson 1946-2015

Sawmill-Coalville Field Trip Report

Driving up the old highway used by early inhabitants, pony express, stage routes, wagon trains and finally the railroad, finds the casual passer-by discovering all sorts of inscriptions.

After driving through a couple of locked gates and up a beautiful canyon with a creek running alongside of the road, our gracious guide NaVee turned the group around and stopped us.


After a short hike we came to a rock face just below a conglomerate formation that had some nice petroglyphs on it. Surrounded by pine trees and beautiful mountain landscapes, and a couple of eagles flying overhead, we started back down the canyon.



When the group arrived back at the gate, Steve, Diana, Leigh, and Dave were nowhere to be seen. Finally NaVee drove back up to see what had happened. Everything was fine, but Steve had found a new site. So the group headed back up to see a red pictograph. Hiking up the talus slope, we discovered another one. There was also a historic inscription that said, "Forgotten by God" September 5, 1927.

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Driving back to Coalville we stopped to look at some ladders in the cliff face above us, and visited an old church in Echo. Returning to Coalville, the group climbed up the hill to a place called The Ledges. There was a lot of graffiti, spray paint, etc. With a little effort our eyes started to see some old pictographs a few layers under the recent names of family members from great grandpa, to the recent high school graduate. There were some nesting cliff swallows that were feeding their young, and the sun trying to bake us to a medium rare status.

Afterward, the group returned to the County Courthouse and ate some lunch and said our good-byes to our host and a few members. The rest of us drove to Redcliff area, to Granny's in Heber for a milkshake, then over to Cascade Springs and down American Fork Canyon.

The next field trip is July 11-12, in the Fillmore/Delta area. Let Steve or Oscar know if you would like to join us. Most of the sites will be drive-up. It's just too hot to hike.

New Books

A Study of the Coso Patterned Body Anthropomorphs, by **Caroline S. Maddock**, has been published by the Maturango Museum of Ridgecrest, California. The book shows 428 figures from Lower Renegade Canyon, Petroglyph Canyon, and Sheep Canyon in the Coso range of eastern California. It includes photographs, sketches, and classification of the figures, and provides a treasure trove of designs for artists working in ceramics, jewelry, textiles, or other crafts. The book is \$12.95 plus tax and shipping and can be ordered by calling the Maturango Museum at 760-375-6900 and asking for the museum store. Museum hours are 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM, daily, Pacific Time. It is also available online at shop.maturango.org.

The White Shaman Mural: An Archaic Codex, by **Carolyn Boyd in collaboration with Kim Cox**, will be published by the University of Texas Press in the distinguished Linda Schele Series in Maya and Pre-Columbian Studies. The book is the culmination of decades of research by the Shumla Archaeological Research & Education Center. Look for it in mid-2016.

The book signals a major shift in the understanding of ancient pictographic murals in the Lower Pecos Canyonlands. In the book, Carolyn demonstrates that these ancient murals can be "read" or interpreted. They are visual narratives that, like books, were composed with purpose and meaning. Carolyn's innovative and meticulous research yielded overwhelming evidence that the White Shaman mural is a creation myth likely painted by early Uto-Aztecan speakers who shared a belief-system that has endured for thousands of years in Mesoamerica.
