Demographic analysis Troy Scotter

Having the membership handled by Wild Apricot makes it easy to display and analyse the data. Here are membership categories from the membership database.

The government and honorary categories are unique. The government category is for our land management partners so they know what we are doing. There is no charge for this membership and they are not required to renew. We approve applications from this group to make sure that someone isn't pretending to be a government person to get free membership. Honorary members are past presidents who get free membership. Honorary members are also not required to renew. In the analysis below I exclude these two groups since their data doesn't really apply. It's interesting that we have no Lapsed Members. I think that means we are aggressively moving expired (lapsed) members into the archived membership category. There are advantages and disadvantages of doing that. A conversation for a different time.

This chart shows the average longevity (in years) of membership in three categories. It provides an idea of member retention.

The archived "no" category means current members, the "yes" category means they are no longer current members, but the record is retained in the archives. Average longevity is 2.36 years. This is a function of the fact that the Wild Apricot database goes back only 6 years, so even the founding members are listed as "sixes" and averaged against members joining in the succeeding years. Even so, it does show that our current members have a fairly short longevity. I think this is a function of the large growth in membership in the last few years.
