Hello URARA,

I'm pretty sure we are all looking forward to getting out and enjoying each other's company at the many activities we are planning this season, including organized field trips, a summer picnic in 9 Mile Canyon, and a live symposium in Vernal with presentations, workshops, and yes, more field trips. Getting together with like-minded friends and experiencing rock art in the field is a big part of what URARA is about.

With all that to look forward to, COVID may be the last thing we want to talk or think about right now. However, after more than two years of a global pandemic that has impacted so many aspects of our lives, the pandemic has not disappeared and we have had to carefully consider how to handle COVID safety with regard to the events we have planned this year.

The URARA Board of Directors has arrived at the following policy: We strongly urge full vaccination for COVID, including boosters, for all participants of events organized and sponsored by URARA. 
Title: A Class III Cultural Resources Inventory for the Soldiers Pass Road Land Sale Project in the Lake Mountains, Utah County

Abstract: Logan Simpson recently conducted a Class III cultural resources inventory for the Utah School and Institutional Trust Lands Administration (SITLA) in support of a proposed land sale in the Lake Mountains in Utah County. The area is known to contain rock imagery, and SITLA specifically requested that Logan Simpson coordinate with the Utah Rock Art Research Association to obtain all relevant data prior to the fieldwork. The inventory resulted in the documentation of 13 archaeological sites, including Indigenous rock imagery and lithic scatters, and non-Indigenous mining features, inscriptions, and the Soldiers Pass Road. This presentation explores the results of the survey with specific emphasis on rock imagery and the military history of the area.

Field Trip Committee Update

URARA is jump-starting the field trip program the weekend of April 30/May 1, and two more later in May. I hope you all get to register for the trip you select, from Tooele and Beaver counties to southern Utah and even California. Please thank your field trip leaders for their spirit of volunteerism when you see them.

Please follow the URARA policy that strongly urges URARA participants to be vaccinated with a full course of COVID shots and boosters. This is important for field trips because you may need to carpool or may not always be able to maintain social distance from another participant. Field trip leaders may sometimes use their own discretion regarding exposure if they are concerned about their trip (e.g., they may ask you wear a mask while carpooling).

If you have a URARA family membership, check that each person you want to include is linked to you. Someone in your family that you want to go on a field trip with must register for that field trip separately. Also make sure your membership is current. And, PLEASE, figure out if you are having surgery or going out of town or whatever, BEFORE YOU REGISTER. It's a lot of work for people who make field trips possible to deal with cancellations.

Appreciate and respect the landscape and the rock art wherever you go this spring. It is a gift from the past. Think about what you see and what you can do to protect it for the future.

Range Creek Field Trip Announcement

Have you ever wanted a guided tour of a relatively undisturbed and isolated canyon where there is a lot of evidence of an ancient culture? If yes, you have a chance to visit Range Creek, a canyon in the Book Cliffs of eastern Utah, on a two-day field trip July 16 and 17.

The Waldo Wilcox family owned a ranch in Range Creek for 60 years and did not talk about what was in the canyon. They sold the property to the state of Utah twenty years ago. Archeologists now know that it was the Fremont people who hunted, farmed, and made beautiful art and cunning structures there. It's also where, in 1950, Clarence Pilling rediscovered 11 remarkable treasures—hand-sized clay figurines—in a Range Creek cave. The figurines currently reside in the Prehistoric Museum in Price, UT.

Steve Acerson and Layne Miller have arranged this trip for URARA through Carbon County Recreation. The cost of the trip is \$200 per person and includes a van ride to the location; a guide; two lunches, a dinner, and a breakfast; and a camping spot for the night. Registration will open in May on the URARA website.

Smith Preserve Documentation Update

The Adelbert Doyle Smith Family Archaeological Preserve (SFAP) and the Utah State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) have recently been working to record the petroglyphs on SFAP for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. Volunteers received training from SHPO and have been working to document sites on the South Knoll located within the preserve. The documentation of petroglyphs on the North Knoll has been completed.

Information being recorded includes:

- Imagery dimensions
- Compass direction the image faces
- Patination
- Degree of exposure, vegetation encroachment, lichen growth, and rock erosion
- Human modification to the image like super imposition and vandalism
- Use of natural rock features in the image
- GPS coordinates
- Overview and close-up photos of the image(s)

Elizabeth Hora, Public Archeologist at SHPO, and Savanna Agardy, Compliance Archaeologist for SHPO, have been leading the fieldwork.

The SFAP offers tours on most Saturdays during April and May and most Saturdays during September and October. About the SFAP:

The Adelbert Doyle Smith Family Archaeological Preserve (SFAP) was established in 2013 as the result of a generous land donation by the Adelbert Smith Family Trust. The 196 acre preserve protects more than 200 prehistoric petroglyphs and multiple features in an effort to educate and inspire the local community and others through preserving the region's prehistoric past. The SFAP is owned by The Archaeological Conservancy and staffed by local volunteers.







Student Investigates Potential Equinox Alignment


A small petroglyph panel near Saratoga Springs informally known as "Table Rock" is intriguing in several ways. It has a concentric circle figure, which, according to Puebloan ethnography, represents the sun. Extending out of the concentric circle "Sun" figure are two lines, each terminating with a pecked dot. When viewing the panel in 2019, URARA member John McHugh noticed that the two dots make an almost perfect alignment with the vernal equinox sunset. So he suggested that Brook Wilson, one of his 6th grade Shovel Bums, photograph the site at the equinox as the basis for her Middle School Science Fair project at Blessed Sacrament School.

Brook agreed, and was joined by her sister, Jade, a former Shovel Bum. Since the Table Rock petroglyph panel is about 30-miles from the girls' house, transportation was necessary. Fortunately Brook has two super supportive grandparents who were willing to make the long, predawn drive and have the girls in photographing position long before the 7:31 AM sunrise.

The lost sleep certainly was worth it. Brook's photographs indicate that the Table Rock sunrise and sunset is only 2 degrees away from a perfect alignment with the vernal equinox sunrise and sunset. She has since written up her data and will present it at her school's Science Fair on March 31st. And with Archaeology Club starting up on April 5th, Brook can only wonder what other rock art marvels the ancient indigenes of Utah will reveal to her.
