From the Prez

Hello URARA,

The Board of directors has just finished our 4th quarter meeting and I'd like to share with you some of the topics we covered. The complete Minutes are on p. 4, below.

First, we covered board officer nominations. Board officers serve one-year terms of up to three consecutive years, and consist of the President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary. Cultural Tradition At Risk - Review

As you have likely realized, most of my Vestige submissions relate to the protection of rock art. But my cause is just! And it's self-serving, as I want all people, myself included, to be able to continue to enjoy it. As many of you have indicated your concerns and interest in the conservation and protection of rock art through our surveys, I thought this might be a good read.

Publication Review

Rock Art, A Cultural Treasure at Risk, Getty Conservation Institute, Los Angeles

There is an excellent publication from The Getty Conservation Institute based in Los Angeles, titled "Rock Art, A Cultural Treasure at Risk", published in 2015. The Institute (GCI) has been an active advocate for advances in conservation practice worldwide. The GCI has had a number of programs over the years specifically directed at improving techniques and approaches for the management and conservation of rock art.

This document gives a wonderful breakdown and discussion covering a vision for the future of rock art. It talks about the heritage and vulnerability of rock art. It gives a foundation of principles for protecting and preserving rock art. There is an example of four pillars of rock art conservation policy and practice. Public and political awareness is discussed. There are examples of effective management systems, physical and conservation practices, and community involvement and benefits. The paper gives a great outline of the way forward in the preservation of rock art. Here is an excerpt from the publication:

"What is rock art and why is it important? Rock art sites contain some of the world's greatest works of art, aesthetically powerful and spiritually charged imagery embedded in cultural landscapes. Rock art consists of paintings, drawings, engravings, stencils, prints, bas-relief carvings and figures in rock shelters and caves, on boulders and platforms. Rock art reflects humankind's rich spiritual and cultural heritage and has great significance to its creators and their descendants. It also has great significance to humanity generally. Its beauty, its symbolism, and its rich narrative means that it is widely appreciated and treasured internationally, regionally, and locally. Its continued existence is important to help global communities recognize and learn about the diverse cultural traditions, their ancient origins and relationships to the landscapes they have inhabited."

We agreed to have the meeting open on ZOOM for those board members and others who will not be able to make it to Moab.

2022 Symposium Review - Darlene Koerner

Survey results

The survey was overwhelmingly positive. There were many positive comments about the field trips, the very nice venue for the symposium, the majority of the speakers. People seemed to be thrilled to be getting together again after 2 years of not having a symposium.

Lessons Learned/Recommendations

- The main difficulty was in getting businesses such as catering companies to be responsive. There seemed to be a post-pandemic inability for businesses to be proactive. Hopefully by next year we will experience some improvement in this area.
- Organizing field trips was also a bit of an issue but with the Field Trip Committee taking on this role, that was a big responsibility removed from the Symposium Committee Chair and seemed to work out well. We will continue with that approach going forward.
- The Convention Center was very nice for the symposium with plenty of space and people to help resolve issues rather quickly. It would be good to continue with this approach going forward.
- There were lots and lots of URARA volunteers who helped with all kinds of activities. Just awesome. Keep it up.

2023 Symposium (Price) Update - Diana Acerson

The Acerson's have made a visit to Price and Layne Miller had prepped several groups for their visit. They had a very good meeting with the Convention Center folks and have the Convention Center booked for Oct. 6, 7 & 8. The Convention Center can do all the catering which simplifies things quite a bit. They also met with someone at the museum and they are willing to help out in any way possible. A list of field trips is already being developed. Dennis DeVore has agreed to own the presenters again. Things are going very well for this point in the planning.

2024 Symposium Location

Two location were nominated for consideration: Beaver and Kanab. Board members should continue to think about any other locations they would like to see considered. We would like to see a final decision made on this at the January board meeting.

Teaching Opportunity - Kent Williams and John McHugh

Salt Lake Community Ed approached URARA with a request for Rock Art class instructor. This is a non-credit, high level overview class for the general public. It would consist of 4 classes over a one month period. Each class would be 1.5 hours. It is unknown at this time if this is a one time event or if they would want to offer the class again in the future.

Two concerns were discussed: 1) Should URARA officially sponsor this class 2) Since John McHugh has agreed to teach the class and develop the materials for the class, do we need to open up this opportunity to other URARA members.

The board agreed that URARA would not be an official sponsor of the class as we don't want to have any kind of liability. It was also agreed that John McHugh would develop the class materials and teach the class and would be the sole recipient of whatever amount of money will be paid for teaching this class. If they want more classes taught in the future, then we can see if others are interested in teaching and we requested that John make his material available if that occurs.

2023 Calendar

Kent will develop an initial calendar for the year that includes at least all of the planned board meetings and the symposium. We will add field trips, annual picnic and Christmas party as those dates are determined.

OPEN ITEMS

- Do we want to renew membership to the Utah Non-Profit Organization? No
- Nomination of several rock art sites near Moab for the National Registry
 - We would like to know the status of this project, which URARA contributed ~\$6,000 to for research. This is currently in the hands of the BLM Moab office but we can't seem to get a clear update on the status.
 - o Darlene K. will call Byron (Vernal area BLM) to see if he can help
- Carol D. will try to contact the BLM in Moab to see if we can get an update and to see if there is anything else that URARA might be able to do to help this project move forward.

Las Vegas Review Journal November 4, 2022

Two Elko residents were sentenced to prison Friday for vandalizing a sacred Native American site in Lincoln County with graffiti.



Vandalism is everywhere. Moab and other areas of the canyonlands and color country of Utah have experienced an explosion of visitation and vandalism, but funding for land management has been at best flat. There is a lack of resources for land managers in enforcement where the protection of cultural resources is concerned. It is easy for vandals doing the destruction to important cultural resources, to do so with relative impunity. It will take legislation to allow more funding to the land managers. Where do your representatives stand on this topic?

As more people go into the desert regions and wilderness areas of Utah, incidents like these have become alarmingly more and more common. The only reasonable thing we can do is record the sites now and try to educate people about their importance.

Please teach and be an example to your friends and family. Share and practice the simple rock art etiquette.

- FINGERS AND TOOLS SHOULD NEVER TOUCH THE ROCK WRITINGS OR IMAGERY – Take only photos or sketch in a sketch pad
- Please do not enhance the images by re-pecking/painting them, or use any other method
- Please help keep the sites intact by not disturbing the ground to unearth images
- Chalking or filling them in, is a no-no
- Please refrain from making rubbings or tracing the images
- Thank you for not trying to clean off dust, lichen, or other substances from the imagery
- Thank you for not adding your own images, names, etc. anywhere on any rock
- Remember these images are sacred to the "People" whose decedents still visit and worship at these sites


It takes everyone to educate people on the importance of these images.
