Hello URARA,

The URARA Board of Directors had our annual retreat in Moab a few weeks ago. We used that time to review how the past year went, and plan for the upcoming year. If you are interested in the details of that meeting, the minutes are posted on the URARA web site on the Members/Governance page along with notes/minutes from all our board meetings. You will need to log in to the web site as a MEMBER, then select GOVERNANCE > MEETING MINUTES.

A quorum of 5 or more board members was present for all portions of the 2-day meeting. Committee Chairs and Appointees attending: Steve Acerson – Field Trips, Troy Scotter – website, Darlene Koerner – Documentation, Research, Carol Duecker- Funds Manager, Werner Duecker - Nominating/Governance Committee. Other members attending portions of the meeting: Lynn Benson, Leigh Grench, Diane Orr, Don & Adele Leavitt, Pam & Quent Baker.

We focused on ways to better engage membership last year and we plan on continuing those efforts this year. One of the ways to do that is by continuing to sponsor field trips. We are also looking at ways to incorporate conservation and preservation of rock art in all our activities, as that was identified as the top priority in the member survey conducted last year, and emphasizing responsible site visitation during our field trips is one way we do that. Sponsoring rock art site documentation and conservation projects under the supervision of professional archaeologists are other ways. Keep an eye on our website for registration for these and other opportunities as they come up during the year.

Besides field trips, other ways for members to become more engaged and get connected with other folks in URARA are the summer picnic, and Christmas dinners. A current calendar of events is posted in all issues of Vestiges so keep an eye on that as well.

We were saddened to learn that the Southern Nevada Rock Art Association (SNRAA) has decided to disband. Since their incorporation in 2002, SNRAA has worked to provide educational programs and assist local government agencies in the study, preservation and protection of rock art in Southern Nevada. SNRAA promoted stewardship through site monitoring and their expertise in recording rock art was widely recognized and respected.

As a part of their dissolution process, SNRAA has decided to donate \$1000 of their remaining assets to URARA. We are grateful for SNRAA's generous donation and it will be used for rock art research, preservation, conservation and education.



Wells Draw Road Amendment: Gate Canyon

The BLM would amend the Right-of-Way on the Gate canyon portion of Wells Draw Road. 5.2 miles of roadway are proposed to be reconstructed; 2.7 miles on land managed by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and 2.5 miles on land managed by the Utah's School and Institutional Trust Lands Administration (SITLA). The application proposes to complete conforming Wells Draw Road to the American Association of State Highway and Transportation (AASHTO) design guidelines.

A 30-day public scoping period is active from January 9, 2023 until February 8, 2023. During this time, written comments will be accepted by letter, email, or ePlanning submission online until the closing date. Please note the most useful comments would be specific, containing new technical or scientific information relevant to the proposed action and/or project area. Please reference "Wells Draw Road Amendment: Gate Canyon" when submitting comments.

This website provides the latest information on this project. Throughout the NEPA process, this website will be updated to include background documents, maps, meeting announcements, published bulletins, and other documents as applicable. For instructions on how to navigate and use this site, review the Video Tutorial in the upper right corner.

BLM will use the NEPA public participation process to satisfy the public involvement requirements under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) (54 U.S.C. § 306108) and pursuant to 36 C F R 800.2(d)(3). The information about cultural resources within the area potential affect for this undertaking will assist the BLM in identifying and evaluating effects/impacts to such resources in the context of both NEPA and Section 106 of the NHPA.



Documentation and Survey

It's time to start thinking about summer and projects that URARA is lining up for members.

Based on responses from members supporting Conservation and Preservation as well as documentation, URARA is scheduling projects jointly with the BLM in Vernal Utah. All scheduled times will be Thursday through Sunday with David Christensen giving training Thursday morning and then heading out to the field in the afternoon. We will document sites through Saturday, and have Sunday to visit sites or survey areas depending on what the group wants to do. Because we're not sure of time requirements, there may be some changes on the weekend as the project takes place. All three locations will require strenuous hiking. We will plan a get-together on Friday evening for all three projects.

What is Patina? Many of our members have wonderful rock art stories & photos which, for a variety of reasons, will never be presented at a URARA symposium. Patina is intended to provide a home for these ideas — a "peoples forum" so to speak — where they can be shared with members and the general public.

Patina is not a blog. Each item is a stand-alone pdf document stored on the URARA website. Over time, we hope to add a variety of stories, remembrances, research papers, theories, photo essays, fine art, poetry, or whatever our members and rock art associates may want to share.

How to Use Patina. Go to www.utahrockart2.org/wa//patina_all.html and browse by title. As of March 2020, we are just getting started (actually reviving a concept first tried in 1993, see below). So for now, we have just a few documents. But.... revisit this site and watch our collection grow.

Who Can Participate? Anyone can submit an item to Patina, provided the subject is relevant to rock art in Utah and the western states. That means a submittal can be about any subject or place in the world if it relates back to the core concepts at URARA.

How to Submit. The material needs to be composed as you want it to appear, then submitted in electronic format to URARA at <u>UtahRockArtResearchAssoc@gmail.com</u>. If your item is too large to email, copy it to a thumb drive and mail to our publications chair: Dennis DeVore, 353 Dakota Circle, Grand Junction, CO 81507.

Editorial Review. We have an editorial board that serves to review the submittals and make policy. The board will respond upon receiving your item. We cannot accept submittals that are offensive or that promote a product or solicit sales. Otherwise, we welcome and encourage a wide range of ideas.

Patina History. In 1993 URARA published the first issue of Patina, with hopes that it would be the "first of many volumes presenting ideas and research from URARA's membership." The concept was sound, but ahead of its time. There was never a second issue. The cost and effort to compile and print subsequent issues was too much. But you can read that first issue <u>right here.</u>


Book Review: Grand Canyon Polychrome

"Grand Canyon Polychrome - Rock Art of the Esplanade" by Nick Eastridge Published in 2022.

Quote from the back cover of the book: After years of exploration, Nick Eastridge revisited all the sites in this book in a single hike. Without revealing locations, this book contains the photographs, sketches, and observations from that trip.

As there is very little information published on the Esplanade Rock Art style, I was curious enough to buy the book. This is a small book, only 63 pages long and is mostly photographs and sketches. The photographs and sketches of the nine sites he visited are good quality and there are quite a few pictures of sites that I have not seen in other sources. The author also utilized a 3D scanning technique and includes full scans of many of the panels which gives a lot more information than isolated photos. So, this is a good reference for those who may be interested in some of what is hidden in the depths of the Grand Canyon. As most of us will never get to these sites due to the difficulty of hiking in the Grand Canyon and the general secrecy of where the sites are located, this is a good way of appreciating those sites.



As much as I enjoyed the photographs and sketches, the book is extremely short on narrative of any kind, other than short descriptions of each site. If you are looking for a discussion about how the author prepared for this trip or the difficulty of the hiking in the Grand Canyon, how to find water or any other details concerning this trip, you will not find them in this book. I understand the necessity of not giving away any details on the locations of these sites, but the book would have been much more enjoyable with at least some narrative. Still, I am glad I have added this book to my library.
