


Symposium Call For Field Trip Leaders

At long last I am *delighted* to announce the launch of the Northern Uinta Rock Imagery Project. Thanks to financial support from URARA I will be able to support volunteer crews for 10 days to record archaeological sites that prominently feature Fremont-aged rock imagery.

I know we're all eager to get the word out for sign ups, so here are the details. This EventBrite link will have people sign up for each individual day that they want to help record. People are *encouraged* to come out for multiple days in a row! If people want to help record the rock imagery, they should sign up under the "URARA and UCSS Volunteer" tickets. Only 15 volunteers can be supported for each day, so sign up early! There will be a waitlist in case we have people who drop out.

Archaeology Month at the Price Museum

The Price Prehistoric Museum held an inaugural Fremont Festival May 6th as part of Utah's Archaeology and Historic Preservation Month. Building on the prehistory weeks at the museum held in the past, "Fremont Fest" was a free public day at the museum celebrating the indigenous cultures that called eastern Utah home across the millennia. The highlight of the museum's participation in historic preservation month was this Family Day on the 6th which featured free admission to the museum and activities for kids from 11:00 in the morning to 3:00 in the afternoon.

Fun activity tables for the visitors were available to interact with, which included Manti-La Sal National Forest, Utah Rock Art Research Association, Utah Cultural Site Stewardship, Carbon County Historical Society, and others. A local BBQ vendor was set up in the parking lot for all food and beverage needs.

URARA's table was supplied and manned by Steven and Diana Acerson. They had the everpopular sand boards for the kids, (adults too), to create their own rock art imagery. Coloring book pages and lots of rock art information were also available for everyone. It was a fun experience.

This is an annual free "Family Day" event, just retitled as the Fremont Festival. It is a great opportunity for folks to see how amazing the museum is, and for us to give out information about URARA and rock art. Thanks to Tim Riley, the museum curator, for the invitation.





Cedar City Documentation Event

URARA helped to coordinate this event initiated by the BLM Utah Cedar City Field office, and partnered with the Utah Cultural Site Steward (UCSS) program, to complete documentation of a large petroglyph site within the Cedar City field office jurisdiction, as part of Archaeology Month.

May 24th and 25th were the dates, and about 20 volunteers from UCSS and URARA, including several folks from the BLM, gathered to assist with this project on the morning of May 24th. After instructions and orientation given by Debra McCarthy, BLM Fuels Archaeologist for the Color Country and Paria River District who spearheaded the event, we were assigned groups to work different sections of the site. With leaders from the BLM and UCSS for each group for the two days, we traversed the rugged terrain and recorded each panel within our assigned areas. Roy Plank, the BLM the District's Fuels Archaeologist/Cultural Data Representative, collected the data for the project at the end of the day.



The groups were able to complete 90% of the site in the 2 days. More panels were also found to add to the number, so it was a very successful event.

Those participating representing URARA were; Steven & Diana Acerson, Jeff Frey, Nina Bowen, and Connie Bridge. Other URARA members were present as UCSS stewards. I apologize for not having their names in time for this article, but without them, we could not have completed this work in the two days.

That recording only included two pictures and a small paragraph that did not describe the type of petroglyphs at the site, their location, or the number of panels. Steve Acerson, who had visited the site more than once, notified Debra at the field office that there were hundreds of panels across the area. The site was then selected as the project for Archaeology Month to rerecord the site to include all the missing petroglyphs.





It was nice to make new friends, put names to faces, and meet the folks we talk to on the phone. The weather cooperated for the most part. We had a little rain the second day, but that didn't hinder our progress. A beautiful place, great people, and gratifying project.

Janet Louise Gorski, 1959 - 2023


