Shovel Bums Continue Commitment to Stewardship

The "Shovel Bums" Archaeology Club is back at Blessed Sacrament School in Sandy, Utah. At present, twenty-two children (3rd through 8th grade) have signed up and the first meeting was on August 24th. Students have been learning the chronology of Southwestern Archaeology and the marquee cultural characteristics and artifacts from the Paleoindian, Desert Archaic, Basketmaker, Puebloan, and Historic period Native Americans. They view artifacts that have been provided by BLM archaeologist Mike Sheehan, and sometimes receive a special lecture and sample a vast array of artifacts provided by SHPO archaeologist Ian Wright. Most meetings close with an atlatl throwing contest in on the ball field.

On Friday field experiences the Shovel Bums excitedly steward rock art in the Lake Mountain region near Utah Lake, giving special care to notice any new erosional patters or vandalism as well as updating any outdated IMACS forms. Their supervisor, Mr. John McHugh, has them break down into groups and fill out IMACS forms and photograph and sketch all panels in a given region so as to hone their skills.

The Shovel Bums look forward to another successful, educational, and enriching field season. In early September the Shovel Bums will be on a special three-day-two-night field trip in the Vernal area to document a fragile rock art panel with BLM archaeologist David Christensen and his crew. Upon completion of their rock art recording they look forward to a scrumptious Dutch Oven dinner provided by URARA's Tim Sweeney and Darlene Koerner! Yum yum.
