Consider Zoom

During the pandemic we were spoiled with Zoom presentations every month on a wide range of topics and images. I have gone back and watched several again. Presentations can be as basic with you narrating what you are showing us. You can share your thoughts and opinions. It's a good place to practice your Symposium presentation.

One of the benefits I found when I did a presentation was it made me a better photographer. I paid closer attention to detail, elements, size, spacing and overall location. I also learned to organize my files better.

Here are a few guidelines for presentations:

- Keep them between 30-50 minutes to allow time for questions and comments
- Be careful about location data. Use a broad description about the location.
- Tuesday nights at 7:00 pm have worked but if another night works better for you, feel free to suggest a different time
