




Symposium Drawing Workshop October 9 Carol Patterson

We had a wonderfully successful workshop. Everyone was a star 'pecker'.

I started the workshop with a power point showing the technique for using color to differentiate between the different ages, especially in superimposition sequences. I passed out only red pens for the petroglyphs and black for outlining the features of the rock. Some panels required blue for proto-historic and historic glyphs. Do not try to "draw" them. "Petroglyphs are fields of dots that create a form" said my Pueblo Indian professor, Alfonso Ortiz.

Thank you to Margaret Barrier for stepping up to the front and encouraging everyone for their first time drawing (pecking) with ink pens on plastic sheet covers over the color photograph of petroglyph panels.







Margaret showing how to hold the pen and move it straight up-and-down in a rapid pecking motion.






Figure 1. Steve and Elna Manning somewhere in Utah south of the Dason-Mixon line


